the declarations they made before their elections. And there was no popular demand for their reversals. He referred to the Louisiana purchase which Jefferson had opposed, to Lincoln's statement that he did not favor freeing the slaves, and to Wilson's re-election campaign, "he kept us out of war."

Abstract liberty on the one hand and economic security—the fleshpots—on the other is the choice confronting the American people. If the fleshpots are the most important the U. S. will go the way of many other nations, adopt the totalitarian form.

The very roots of democracy lie in the rights of human equality and opportunity, and such notions as the French overthrew their system because those rights were enjoyed by only a few.

Democracy always resents inequality of opportunity and humanity will always resent inequality of social and economic opportunity, the judge declared in closing, but the only safe and sure path for social security is that emanating from a state of democracy.
