### H. S. Debates Are On This Evening

Debate enthusiasts of Coquille will be glad to hear that the first round of non-decision debates will be held this (Thursday) evening, Feb. 10, at eight o'clock in the high school auditorium. Myrtle Point's negative team will come to Coquille to meet Videlle Kelley and La Velle Dale, who will uphold the affirmative. At the same time Jack Martin and Leonard Farr will support the negative at North Bend.

The topic selected for debate is: "Resolved, that the several states should adopt a unicameral system of legislation." Since everyone is interested in how the legislature is organized, there should be a large crowd out to hear this debate.

Another reason for interest in debate this year is that the local debate squad has just returned from the debate tournament held every year at Linfield College in McMinnville. About forty high schools enter this speech tournament, which presents contests in debate, oratory, extemporaneous speaking, and declamation. About four hundred students in all were entered in the various contests. Seventy-three teams, representing 28 schools, participated in the debate tilts.

Each team entered was required to debate on both sides of the question. During the two days of the tournament each of the two Coquille teams took part in six debates, upholding the affirmative three times and the negative three times. To shift suddenly from one side to the other and back again is a difficult matter but, despite that, the Coquille teams performed in a very creditable manner, winning more than half of their debates in the first six rounds, and in so doing have gained much valuable experience.

Friends of the team members will be surprised at the degree to which they have improved. It is certain that all the patrons of the high school will enjoy hearing this series of debates. Admission is free and everyone is welcome.
