County Teachers to

Meet Here Saturday

Coos county teachers will gather in Coquille high school Saturday, February 17th, at 9:30 a. m. W. J. Rice, head of the Rice Penmanship, will give a talk and demonstration pertaining to the new system of writing which has recently been adopted for Oregon.

Florence Hill Morrison, instructor in the North Bend high school, who has been of much help to teachers in past meetings, will talk on the subject of teaching the child as a whole. She will also give help in problem solving in Arithmetic.

At this meeting, rural teachers will receive the results of their pupils' Standard Tests, "Unit Scales of Attainment," as well as the material for the "Save The Battleship Oregon Campaign."

This meeting is being sponsored by the Intermediate and Primary Teachers associations of the county, the president of the former being Miss Grace Cox of Millington school and of the latter, Mrs. June Balch, principal of Empire school.

The executive committee of rural teachers has arranged a week's schedule for V. D. Bain of the State Department of Education. The committee members are as follows:

Mr. Bain has recently taken over the division of Elementary Education in the State Department of Education and desires to get a bird's eye view of the conditions in the state.
