Home Ec. Class Presents Style Show

The climax of the semester's work was the Home Economics fashion show at the high school auditorium Friday evening.

Sixty-eight garments made by the two domestic art classes were shown, mostly being modeled by the makers, to the piano accompaniment of Miss Rose Naef. During the intermission the following took part in an entertaining program: reading, Betty Sprout; group of songs, Virginia Young and Maxine Stevenson; novelty dance, Donna Dunn and Marjory Hardenbrook.

Marvine McClellan, in a simple sports outfit, demonstrated what the well-dressed high school girl should wear, while Lita Shultz gave an example of what the student should not wear in a dress, high heels and considerable jewelry.

Among the attractive frocks seen was a peasant cotton, in bright print, with full skirt and laced bodice. Another in navy wool had a smart trimming of plaid buttons with a matching tailored bow at the belt. Among the silk frocks, taffeta was the most popular fabric, although there were several attractive prints.

Two of the girls in the advanced class had made formal gowns, one being of gold taffeta on beautifully simple lines, and the other of dark blue tulle with white and gold flowers and a corsage of white flowers at the neckline. Two tailored suits of grey worsted were especially good-looking.

The home economics department has progressed by leaps and bounds since Meredith Davey, the head of the department, began her duties here two years ago.

In the sewing classes the first-year girls are required, after their samplers have been finished, to make a cotton apron or slip, culottes or pajamas, and a house dress. During the second year they make a child's garment, a silk or wool dress or suit, and a speed project, which is usually a cotton frock. As a class project last year the girls made attractive curtains for their class room. This year they have slip-covered the furniture in the girls' league room. Four portable and one cabinet electric sewing machines are among the present equipment of the department.

In the domestic science division the girls are cooking three days a week and devoting the other two to research and note-book work. The first-year students are studying breakfasts at present, while the second year group is working on dinners. Extra credit in both classes may be earned at home by preparing one meal every day for two out of every six weeks.

For the use of the cooking classes are two modern electric stoves, eleven hot-plates, five preparation tables, each of which is used by four girls, and one demonstration table.

Related Art is another subject which all Home-Economics students are required to take. The class is compiling an inventory of clothing on hand, with the object of making a wardrobe budget for the coming year.

This is one of the most interesting and practical departments of the school and the success with which it is being conducted is a sincere compliment to Miss Davey's ability.
