Music Department **Progresses at School**

The music department, installed in the Coquille schools as a regular sub-ject for the first time this year, is making rapid progress. It is being taught as a part of the curriculum in the first six grades.

In the primary departments, tone onsciousness is stressed and an effort is made to break the monotone in which most primary children are accustomed to sing. In the second grade, the youngsters are trained in rhythm, and are taught to read mu-sic, instruction of which is continued in the third grade.

In the fourth grade the children are singing two-part music. In the fifth and sixth grades sight reading is taught, and the classes are grouped for three-part music-soprano, alto and baritone. Ear-training is also a and baritone. Ear-training is also a part of their training in these grades. The seventh and eighth grades are not required to take music this year. If the students wish to take part in the S. A. B. Chorus, which is com-posed of both boys and girls and is doing three-part work, they may do so, or if they wish to take part in the junior band, they may, but are not graded nor given credit in music for these activities

The instructor, Miss Anita Pageler, is unusually well qualified for her position. 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
