He declared the incorporation of unions is not needed, but union re-sponsibility is needed and penal law is needed to punish the men or organizations which violate the law and create a reign of terror. Labor's weapon's, the boycott, the picket and the secondary boycott are made legal under existing federal laws, but abuse of those weapons' use should

be stopped. Referring to the fact that hearsay evidence is permissable at Nationall Labor Relations Board hearings, he stated that the Clayton act has abolished the right of injuction in labor disputes but the illegal injunction of labor on industry is what is killing business in America.

Many acts by the unions are unlawful but there is no law providing for prosecution and penalty for violation. The extortion statute should be amended to cover the labor racketeer's activity and to stop him and protect the union member himself. He urged an organization in every town, every county in the state, of John Public, and public sentiment ould and would stamp out the corruption which is rampant and would prevent such things as have happened 92 in Portland the past year.
