

Cos People at Home Economics Conference

Attendance at the eighth annual Home Interests Conference at Oregon State College reached a new high mark of 721 registered delegates. There were nine delegates representing Coos county, Mrs. Rex Ingram, county home demonstration agent, says. These were Mrs. Alton McCue, of Bandon, who is the Chairman of the Coos county home economics advisory committee and a member of the Oregon state council which held their council meeting on the first day of the Home Interests conference. Other delegates were, Mrs. Walter Laird, of Myrtle Point; Mrs. Olaf Aasen and Mrs. Rex Menegat and Mrs. Geo. Hampton, of Arago; Mrs. Carol Rycraft, of Riverton; Mrs. Walter Lillenthal and her mother from Coos River. All of the delegates agree that the two highlights of the conference were the address Wednesday morning by Viljalmur Stefansson, the famous Arctic explorer, who talked on "What Russia is doing in the Far North," and the concert given by the Portland Symphony Orchestra Wednesday night, which will be one of their last performances unless the people of Oregon respond to a drive to raise funds to keep the orchestra going.

During each morning at the conference, which was from February 7th to 11th, group meetings were held on the subjects of "Clothing and Textiles," "Foods and Nutrition," "Home Management," "Parent Education," "Landscape Gardening" and "Recreation." The women had their choice of attending any one of these group meetings each morning. In the afternoons there were tours of the campus, a concert by the students of the musical department, an art exhibit, a modern farm kitchen on display, a hobby show of active hobbies exhibited by people of Oregon which was attended by more than 1500 persons, and many other interesting features.

Pictures of the Long Beach earthquake will be shown at the Assembly of God on Sunday night. Rev. R. D. E. Smith, pastor of the church, is to preach a sermon on "The Last Great Earthquake" and will show the earthquake pictures by way of illustration. He was present in Long Beach during the catastrophe and took the pictures himself. Views of almost every place where acts of heroism occurred are included. There will be some slides of the San Francisco earthquake, including a view of the great fire cross that burned in the heavens over the city during the conflagration and which was accepted by many as of supernatural origin. The sermon deals with the Newtonian theory of geology—a theory first formulated by Sir Isaac Newton—and while in opposition to much that modern geology teaches, such as the ice age, etc., it does present truth in alignment with the Bible record of a universal deluge. The text is "As it was in the days of Noah, so shall it be in the days of the coming of the Son of Man," a sermon on the second coming of Christ.

The stereopticon pictures will be shown from 7:15 until 7:45 Sunday evening with the regular evangelistic service and the sermon on "The Last Great Earthquake" immediately following.

B. W. Dunn Reports on Superintendents' Meeting

Supt. Dunn, of the Coquille schools, was among those who went to Salem to attend the association meeting of the Department of Superintendence of Oregon State, Feb. 11 and 12. This is the third annual meeting of the group, with an attendance of over one hundred.

Gov. Martin delivered the opening address. In the course of his speech he said, "Democracy is only functional under education. We have a rich heritage of ancestral stability, but we can lose that inheritance if we have not the character and spirit to conduct active campaigns against such things as the longshore strike of 1936, for instance, which cost the United States \$832,000,000.

Rex Putnam, state superintendent, reported on the final drafting of administrative credentials. Hereafter superintendents must hold a valid Oregon State Teachers' Certificate, have taken twelve term hours of elementary training, and completed at least three years successful teaching on both elementary and secondary levels.

Dr. H. H. Dixon, head of the Dept. of Psychiatry, told of his work with two thousand maladjusted children, all of whom could have been normal children if proper facilities and machinery for teaching could have been placed in the home and school.

Marshall Dana, assistant editor of the Oregon Journal, brought out several appealing angles. He asserted that young men step out into communities that have produced them, and were treated as strangers; that young men and women should be made to feel that they are wanted, needed and appreciated, and that an opportunity waits for them.

Other subjects taken up at this conference were teachers' training and placement, school revenues and custodial administration, which concerns the care, upkeep of the supplies and property of the school. The school for janitors, which formerly was held for two days in the summer has been extended to five days this year. About twenty such schools are held throughout the state.

The total 1937 enrollment, reported from national headquarters, was 444,200, a gain of 19,889 over the previous record in 1936. The advance enrollment for 1938 was 314,852, an increase of 18,323 over the advance enrollment last year, and 71.41 per cent of the 1938 membership goal. The local Auxiliary unit also began the year with a large advance enrollment, having 50 members enrolled for 1938.
