Educator Inspects Schools

V. D. Bain, head of elementary education in the state department of education, visited some 37 rural schools with County Supt. Martha E. Mulkey, last week.

Mr. Bain has recently begun work under the state superintendent of public instruction, Rex Putnam, and is visiting several counties in order to get a bird's eye view of the rural school situation.

When visiting these schools in Coos county he tested the lights in each by means of light meter. He arrived at the conclusion that most buildings were faulty in lighting and felt that this question should receive first attention. Due to savings so many dark days, well placed artificial lights should be installed in each class room and in several cases more window space provided.

Mr. Bain stated that the school library was our next biggest problem. He recommends that school boards remove from the libraries all books which were beyond the period of usefulness and that those which were well worn but still of value be rebound.

Conferences were held with groups of rural teachers at Mulkey, Eastside, Bandon and Norway schools.

Last Friday Mr. Bain, upon request, checked the Powers High School for standardization.
