C. H. Lucia Buried Monday

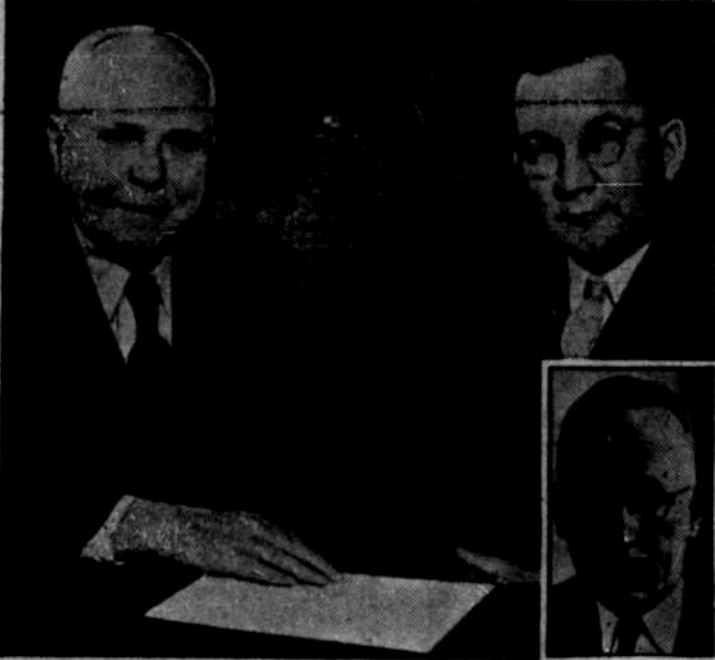
