Mr. and Mrs. Perry Neal finished moving into their new home last week.

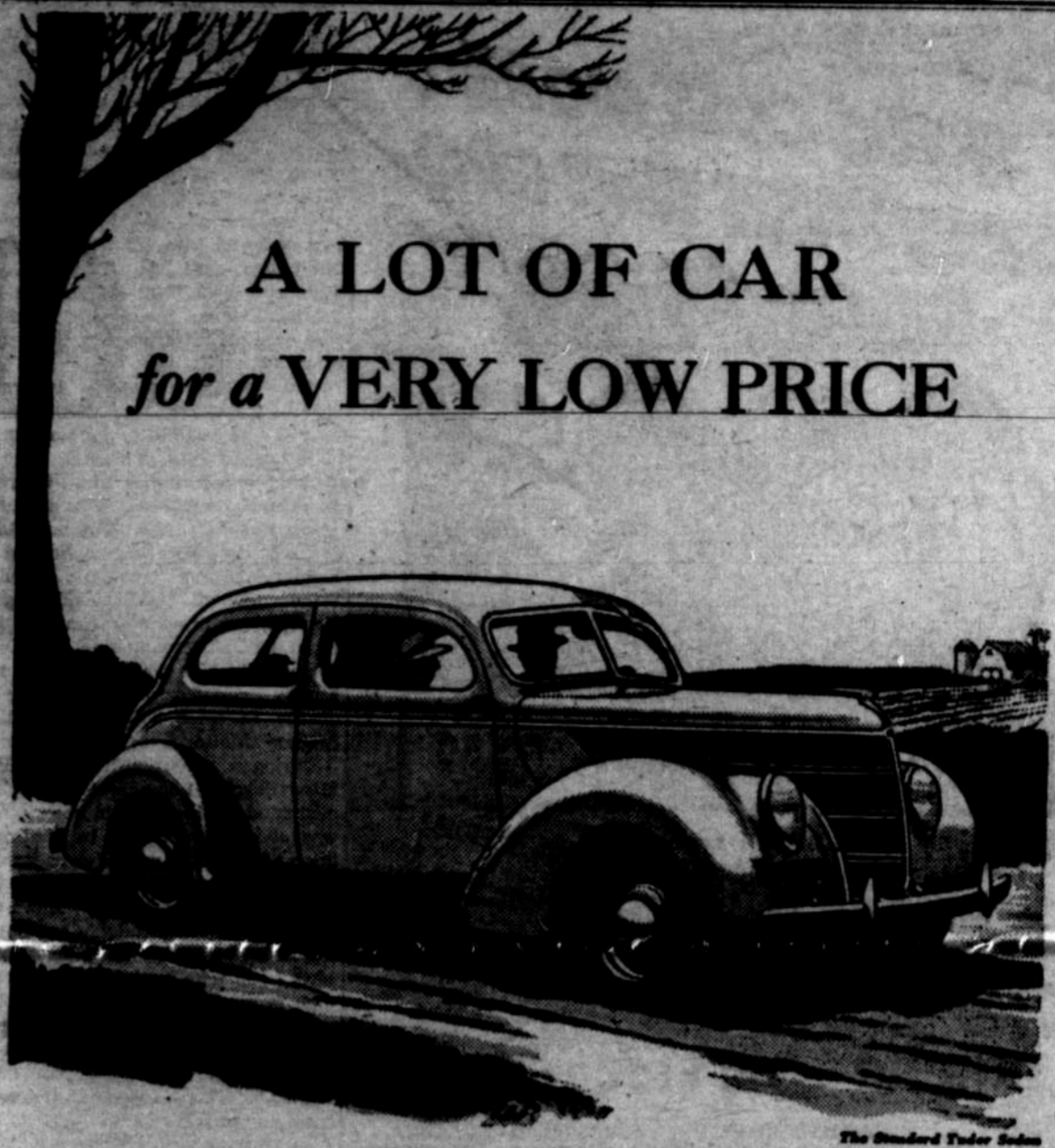
