### Students Having Hearing Tested

Large numbers of boys and girls from over the county are availing themselves of the hearing test. This testing is being carried on by the state board of health, through the use of the audiometer. The service is open to children in grades above the 3rd, and through the 8th.

In the past hearing difficulties have not always been recognized and this service which is given free to boys and girls is being welcomed. Children from small schools are being brought by parents to the testing centers.
