up to date and to prepare plans, specifications and estimates for the proposed sewer on Eleventh street. It would require about three days for the work and the agreed wage was \$8 a day.

The Coquille Aerie of Eagles was given an agreement for Saturday night use of the Community Building every week in the year except for the Legion's Armistice and St. Patrick's day and the Woman's Club May Day dance. The Eagles are to pay \$10 each Saturday night whether a dance is given or not, but the present intention of the dance committee is to hold the dances weekly.

Bob Train was given ten days to get the sidewalk in front of his building on Front street repaired. If not started in that time the city will do it and assess the costs against the property.

An agreement was made with Mrs. Ernest Whereat, whereby she agrees to pay \$20 down and \$10 a month until the \$50 the city has invested in the property is paid, for the old Grush place east of the Henry street bridge, between Fourth and Fifth, and Beach and Collier.

C. L. Elkins having bought out the interest of his partner, Mr. Howell, in the pool room at the south end of Taylor street, the council approved his application for a package B liquor license and a beer license.

The application of a restaurant license by L. Hickenbottom, who recently leased the car hamburger place next to Isler's Sheet Metal shop, was laid over until August 15 at the request of the state sanitary inspector. The new proprietor was given until then to provide toilet facilities for his place.
