"Mannequin" Is Big Attraction On Roxy Screen Sunday, Monday, Tuesday

Joan Crawford, who has romanced on the screen with Clark Gable, Robert Taylor, Robert Montgomery, Gary Cooper and other famous film heroes, adds rugged, two-fisted Spencer Tracy to her long list in "Mannequin," which co-stars them for the first time. The new film opens at the Roxy Theatre Sunday for a showing of three days.

Frank Borzage directed the swift-moving story of modern young people against a background of New York's grimy tenements and multi-millionaire's penthouses from the pen of Katharine Brush, author of "Young Man of Manhattan."

Miss Crawford as Jessie Cassidy has the role of a shop girl who seeks escape from poverty by marrying Eddie Miller, a cheap crook. Eddie is played by Alan Curtis, Hollywood's newest leading-man discovery. When Eddie falls her, Jessie decides to live her own life. John L. Hennessey, a role which gives Tracy a powerful characterization as a man who worked his way up from the docks to become a wealthy steamship owner, turns to her.

Jessie marries Hennessey. She learns to love him when Eddie attempts to blackmail them. His plan fails because Hennessey goes broke. This gives Jessie the chance to prove her love in a surprising and dramatic climax.

In prominent featured roles are Ralph Morgan, Mary Phillips, Oscar O'Shea, Elizabeth Risdon and Leo Gorcey.

A highlight of the new picture is Miss Crawford's singing of "Always and Always," a haunting melody of the torch-song type, which was especially written for the star by Edward Ward, with lyrics by Bob Wright and Chet Forrest.

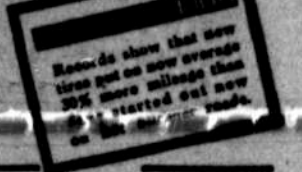

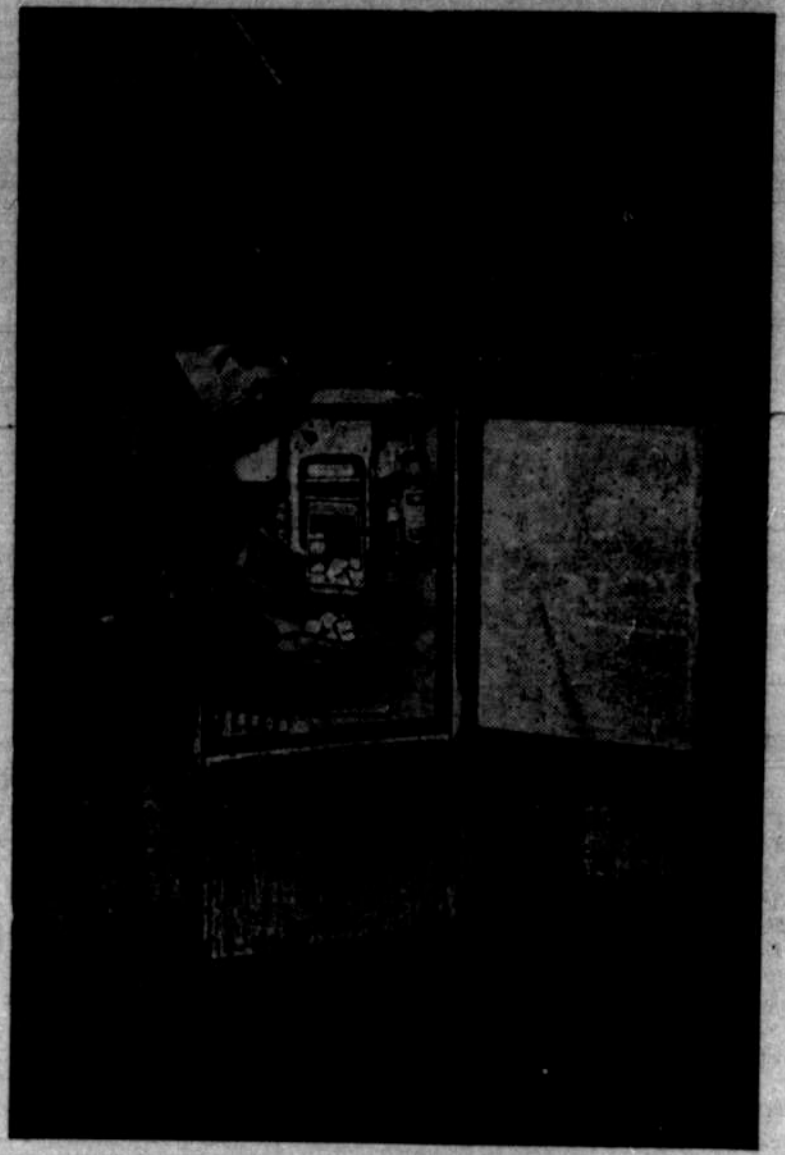

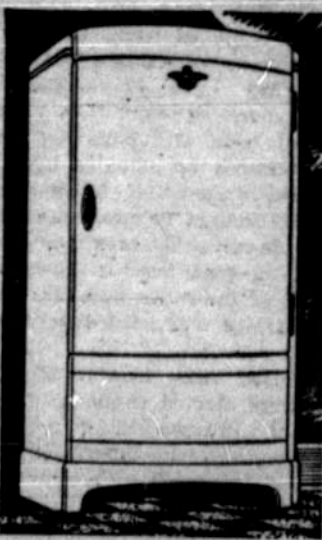
