F. G. Jennings to Head Red Cross

Rev. Frederick G. Jennings was elected president of the Coos county Red Cross at a meeting held here Tuesday evening. He succeeds Mrs. W. G. Barrow, who has served for six years. Other officers chosen were L. A. Blanc, vice president; Mrs. L. A. Parr, secretary; Willis Ekblad, treasurer, all from Marshfield; with Ralph Juul North Bend, Dr. R. M. McKeown and L. A. Parr, Marshfield, as directors. The unit heads in the various cities in the county are also members of the board. Rev. Geo. R. Turney is the Coquille member.

Report on the 1937 Roll Call showed a total of 1170 members, the largest in Coos county since 1924. The amount collected was \$1,189.35, of which \$594.68 was sent to the national Red Cross headquarters, the balance remaining in Coos county. The membership in the various towns was: Marshfield, 507; Coquille, 155; North Bend, 147; Myrtle Point, 144; Bandon, 135; Empire, 43; Powers, 29, and Lakeside, 10.
