tain section in Tillamook county as the No. 1 project, the straightening and rebuilding of the North Bend to Bandon section as second on its program, and the rebuilding of the highway in Curry county below Port Orford as third.

The No. 2 project asks for raising the dike here at Coquille this summer and the Marshfield-Coquille highway rebuilding as rapidly as possible.

As Mr. Norton stated in one of his brief introductions of - speakers, "When the bridges were finished and all gaps in the Coast Highway filled, we thought we had a permanent highway." But highways are never permanent; they last a few years and must be rebuilt to accommodate new demands for faster and smoother travel.

Geo. I. Warren, director of publicity for Victoria, B. C., and Vancouver Island, who never misses a meeting of the Coast Highway Association, was there but was confined to his room in the Gardiner Tavern until Tuesday, threatened with pneumonia.

North Bend was selected as the host city for the annual meeting of the association which will be held soon after the middle of October.
