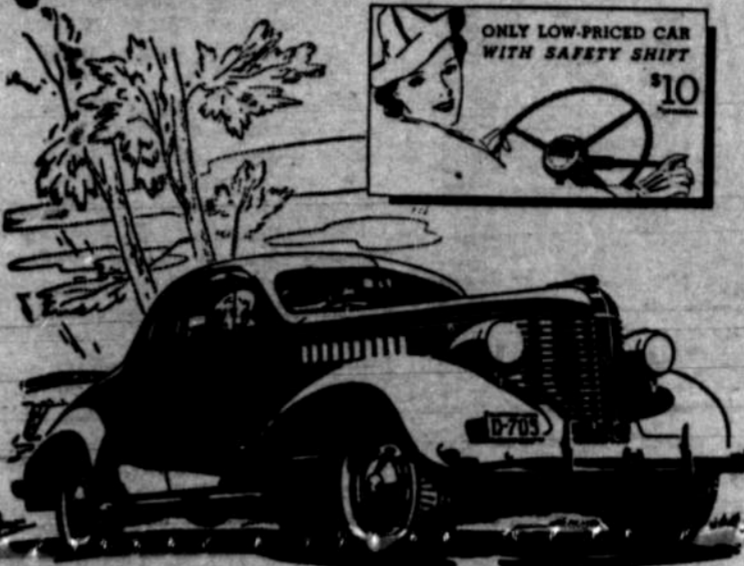
Tonight for Coming Year
