


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FAIRVIEW

Frominent Curry County Resident Passed Last Week

Robert Lee Wagner, son of Daniel and Mary Wagner, was born at Valle Crucis, North Carolina, Oct. 11, 1871. He died at Myrtle Point April 21, 1938. With his parents and older sister, Emma, he arrived in Coos county June 1, 1872, and has resided in Coos and Curry counties the past 66 years.

On October 24, 1897, he was united in marriage to Oma L. McCracken at Marshfield. To this union were born five children, all of whom survive. Mrs. Gertrude Zumwalt, of Sixes; Mrs. Vera Sutton, of Gold Beach; Clyde and Paul, of Port Orford, and Clarence, of Portland, are the children.

Robert Wagner was the first to be called from a family of eight children, those surviving are Mrs. Emma Hermann, of Broadbent; J. Tice Wagner, of Ontario; Mrs. Ella Strang, of Coquille Mrs. Lily Dement, of Powers; Mrs. Elizabeth Lett and Mrs. Sarah McCloskey, of Norway, and a half brother, Dan Marsters, of Eugene. He is also survived by nine grand children.

Mr. Wagner was a butcher by trade, owning and operating a shop in Myrtle Point for a number of years. About 24 years ago he moved to Curry county and purchased a large dairy farm. The present farm on the Coos river have operated since. He has taken an active part in the affairs of his community and Curry county. At the time of his death he was serving as commissioner of Curry county, was president of the Curry county fair board since its organization, commissioner of Port of Port Orford, director of the Port Orford high school, director of the Coos and Curry federal land board association, an active member of Curry county livestock association and a member of the Grange.

He was a man of whom too much cannot be said of his kind and influential disposition.

J. H. Radabaugh Buried at Eugene April 20

Joseph H. Radabaugh, formerly of Arago, died Monday morning, April 18, at the Sacred Heart hospital in Eugene, at the age of 79 years. He was born January 25, 1859, in Mercer county, Ohio, and was the eldest son of John and Nancy Radabaugh, early pioneers of Coos county. He moved with his parents to Minnesota in 1867 and in 1875 the family came to Oregon, settling in Coos county, where he lived until 1922, when he moved with his family to Eugene, Oregon, locating in the River Road community.

He was married March 25, 1891, to Miss Mattie W. Wimer, of Arago, Oregon.

Mr. Radabaugh had been a member of the United Brethren Church for many years and lived a consistent Christian life up to the time of his death. Being of a friendly, cheerful disposition, he made friends wherever he went and never was heard to say an unkind word of anyone. He was highly respected wherever he lived and left a host of friends, both in Coos county and at Eugene, where he lived at the time of his death. He is survived by his widow; three daughters, Mrs. Merle Stephens, of Yakima, Wash.; Miss Hazel Radabaugh, of San Jose, Calif., and Mrs. Carl B. Steckmet, of Portland, Oregon by two sons, J. Hermann Radabaugh, of Seattle, Wash., and Reuben J. Radabaugh, of Eugene; by one brother, A. J. Radabaugh, of Myrtle Point, and by three grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, April 20, at the Vestch Chapel, Rev. E. M. Patterson officiating, and interment was in Rest Haven Memorial Park, Eugene.
