

The Keysers will sail from Vancouver, B. C., June 7th for Burma where Mr. Keyser will serve as general missionary in Bassein, where there is a large Baptist mission sta-tion controlling six large schools and a great many small ones. He will be assisted by his wife, who will also have the supervision of the girls' school in Bassein.

Mr. and Mrs. Keyser were married in Mandalay, Burma, in 1935, where she as Miss Eva Cummins, was superintendent of the Baptist Girls' school, while he was principal of the boys' school in Toungoo.
