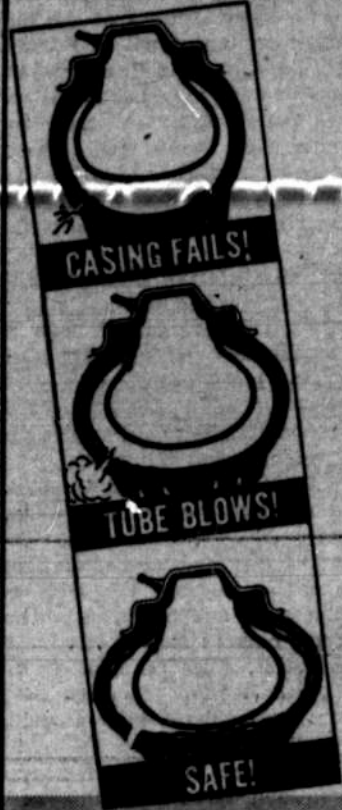

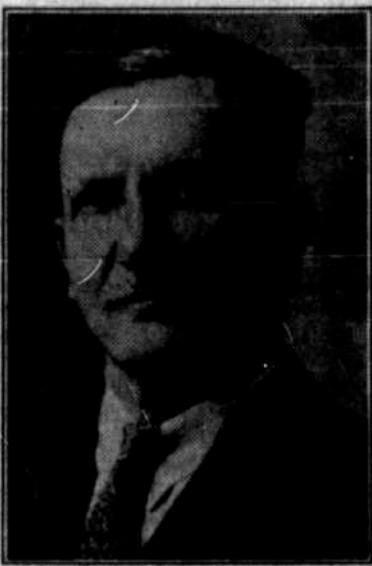

**Coquille Visitors Enroute to Burma**

Rev. and Mrs. Walter Keyser are interesting Coquille visitors this week at the home of Mrs. Keyser's parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Cummins. Mrs. Keyser and her little son, Jan Peter, arrived a fortnight ago from Williamsport, Pa., her husband following a week later from Boston, where he had been on a speaking tour.

The Keyser's will sail from Vancouver, B. C., June 7th for Burma, where Mr. Keyser will serve as general missionary in Bassein, where there is a large Baptist mission station controlling six large schools and a great many small ones. He will be assisted by his wife, who will also have the supervision of the girls' school in Bassein.

Mr. and Mrs. Keyser were married in Mandalay, Burma, in 1935, where she as Miss Eva Cummins, was superintendent of the Baptist Girls' school, while he was principal of the boys' school in Toungoo. After their marriage they sailed for America, visiting Coquille for three weeks before going east to Williamsport, Pa., where they spent some time visiting

Mr. Keyser's parents. They then moved to Atlantic City, N. J., where they spent a year studying. It was here that little Jan was born.

In the fall of 1936 they embarked for Puerto Rico, where Mr. Keyser taught English and general science for a year in the government school.

At the close of the term they returned to Chester, Pa., where he was in the government school. Theological Seminary. In March he received his appointment to Burma.

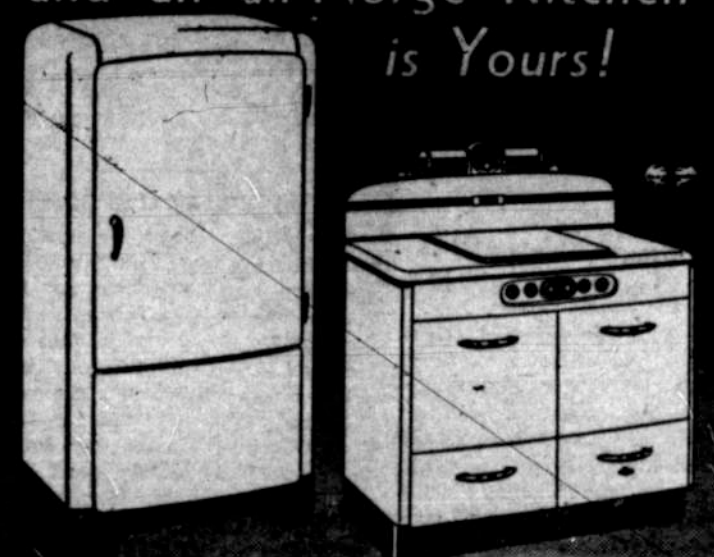
