**O'Dowdy Barred From

In last Friday's matches at the Coquille Community Building, the semi final came out on top as the prize bout of the evening, due chiefly to the stellar work of a newcomer—Benny Dean, late of Mexico.

Dean showed the fans a powerful body, well tanned by the Mexican sun and an ability to wrestle second to none. His opponent, Flash Kelly, of Los Angeles, soon found out that he couldn't do much with the southerner's arms. Dean made clever use of the ropes and his elbows.

He took the first fall in 15 minutes, using a standing arm breaker hold which Kelly gave up to immediately and without further ado. The second, and only other fall of the match, came just 11 minutes later. Again Dean had out-powered his man and weakened Kelly's arm. About three seconds after Dean hooked on the standing arm breaker hold, Kelly again was forced to concede the fall.
