Neil Watson Not a Candidate

Neil O. Watson, of Millington, states that he will not be a candidate for reelection as director of Non High district from Zone III. Mr. Watson has served the board in this capacity ever since the Non High district was organized.

Candidates must come from either Millington, Delmar or Bunker Hill school districts. In order for name to be placed upon the ballot on June 20, the aspirant must file with the county school superintendent a petition of nomination at least 15 days before the third Monday in June. Said petition must have been signed by at least 30 voters of the zone which he is representing. The candidate must be a qualified voter on school tax. Petition blanks can be secured at the office of county school superintendent.

Fat Lamb and Wool Show To Be Held in County in July

Directors of the Coos County Livestock Association will sponsor a fat lamb and wool show to be held at the county fair grounds some time between the middle and the last of July of this year, according to action taken by this body at a special meeting held in the county agent's office last Friday evening.

The purpose of this show is to stimulate interest in the better quality of sheep in an effort to make this growing industry more profitable. Wool growers in all sections of the county have expressed unusual interest in this project and are expected to participate in the show.

While all details have not been completed, it is expected that classes will include pens of five fat lambs ready for market, individual market lambs, dressed carcasses, and wool. Breeding classes will be exhibited at the county fair in September which is held too late for the classes of market lambs.

County School News from Mrs. Martha Mulkey's Office

School Programs
Programs and exhibits of different description are now manifest throughout the county. A few which have come to our attention are as follows:
Myrtle Point closed their 4-H work on April 22, with a large, attractive, 4-H exhibit, including the following projects: Clothing—all five divisions; bachelor sewing and cooking I.
On April 29 in the armory the Marshfield school presented its tenth annual musicale.
Last Thursday evening the Bunker Hill school celebrated 4-H achievement day with display, style review, etc. "Fat Elk" will follow soon.
On May 6 Riverton is planning for local track and field day. On the same date Bridge will have track, May pageant, exhibit and community lunch. Remote school will participate in this.
The pupils of the Broadbent school are preparing for next year's work through a clean-up. They have to date refurnished the pupils' desks and the book case.
Representative of State Normal Here
Miss Jeanette Smith, of Southern Oregon State Normal school, is this week visiting several schools with the county superintendent. Through this means the State Normal and the county office hope to be able to be of more help to teachers. Miss Smith is head of the primary education department at the Ashland Normal.
Library Project
Several schools have already sent in books to be cared for by the three women who are working under a WPA project in the court house.
Whatever service is deemed best by the workers is given to these books, for example: recasing, mending, tears, washing, shelacking, etc. This will afford a splendid opportunity for all school districts, both large and small, to get library and state adopted texts ready for use, unless funds should unexpectedly be cut off. Children who handle clean books are more interested in keeping them clean.

New Church Dedicated at Bandon

Several carloads of Coquille people motored to Bandon Sunday to be present at the dedication services to the new Baptist church. Dr. T. H. Hagen, of Portland, delivered the morning address, after which dinner was served to a large group in the pleasant new fellowship room.
During the afternoon service, Dr. F. W. Starring, executive secretary of the Oregon Baptist Association, delivered the address, with fourteen other ministers participating.
The sermon for the evening was delivered by Dr. J. R. Turnbull, of Roseburg.

The new church building is the first to be erected after the fire, and while not completely finished in the interior as yet, it presents a pleasant appearance and provides adequate room for all church functions. Several separate Sunday school rooms, Ladies Aid room, kitchen, fellowship room, choir room, and baptistry have all been provided in the building. A fireplace in the fellowship room and paneled plywood finish in all rooms but the main auditorium are attractive features, and handsome electric fixtures supply adequate light. Many friends and societies outside of Bandon contributed to the building and supplies. A piano was the gift of Hinson Memorial church, at Portland. Hymn books were sent by many groups throughout the state and carpenter and electrical work was largely contributed by Bandon men. The church is proud of the fact that less than one hundred dollars of the whole project remains to be paid. Much praise is due to Rev. Delbert Loree, pastor, who has seen the church through the fire and re-established to its present state.
