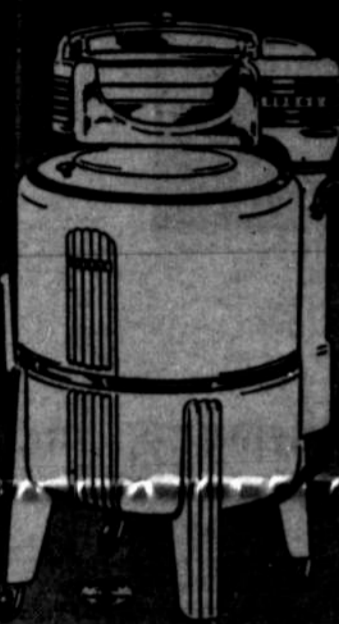


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### Social Notes

Hartwell, of Riverton, and Secretary Potts, was delegated to compile data regarding the status of the silver fox industry in Coos county for the past two years, and to present this information at the next regular meeting of the association which will be held June 12th at the Carman Fox Farm at Gaylord.

#### Seven New Bishops Named at M. E. South Conference

The General Conference of the Southern Methodist Church, which met at Birmingham, Alabama, adjourned last week after voting for unification with the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Protestant Church. The vote was 434 for unification and 28 against.

The conference elected seven new bishops as follows: Ivan Lee Holt, who has been pastor of St. John's Methodist Church in St. Louis for 20 years; William Walter Peele, of Charlotte, North Carolina; Claire Purcell, of Gadsden, Alabama; Charles C. Seelmann, who has been president of Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas, for 16 years; John Lloyd Decell, Jackson, Mississippi; William C. Martin, who has served as pastor of First Church, Dallas, Texas, of the past seven years; and W. T. Watkins, who has been professor of Church History at Emory University since 1930.

We understand that Bishop Martin has been assigned to the Pacific Coast area. This being the case, he will preside over the Northwest Annual Conference which meets this year in Pioneer Methodist Church, Coquille. We can assure him a hearty welcome when he comes to preside over his first conference since being elected to this high office.

#### Mott Helps Secure Additional Federal Aid for Highways

Highway users of Oregon and the other forty-seven states were last week given a helping hand by the United States House of Representatives as it passed the new Cartwright road bill to continue federal aid for highways during 1940 and 1941.

A large part of the credit for the success of this measure belongs to Congressman James W. Mott, first district, Salem, Ore. As a ranking member of the house committee on roads, Mr. Mott played a leading part in the making of the present federal road policy which approximately doubles the amount of federal funds available to the states under the old policy. He has figured prominently in the committee hearings which led to the introduction of the new measure.

This bill makes available to the states for highway construction purposes \$238,000,000 in 1940 and the same sum in 1941. This money is to be expended principally for the construction of modern safe highways, the improvement of farm-to-market roads and the elimination of dangerous grade crossings.
