Judge Says No P. O. This Year

Judge Hugh McLain, who returned last week-end from Washington, D. C., says that the prospect for passage of the bill giving Coos and Curry counties a larger percentage of receipts from timber sold from the Coos Bay Wagon Grant lands are very bright, although final action may not be had until congress reconvenes next January.

He also says that there is practically no hope for Coquille to secure a federal building appropriation this year.
