Wallpaper Goes to Town!



Wallpapers have gone gay in a big way this season. You're likely to find most anything cascading down the walls—from a bunch of carrots and cabbages to a fine bouquet made up—on closer inspection—of very modern arty hands and eyes.

And speaking of wall flowers (which we weren't), no one's going to feel sorry for those on the new, old-fashioned floral papers. The ghosts of Queen Victoria and your maternal great-great-grandmother would sigh in pleasure over some of the paper lilies, cabbage roses, ferns and forget-me-nots.

Not that you're restricted to flowers—far from it. It's true they're once more "in," but there

are beautiful plain papers in soft or vivid colors and patterns—conventional and modern. Also, a good many patterns are available in several different colors. For instance, a pattern may have a main background of blue with white figures—but the same pattern may also be in green and cream, brown and cream, or red and white. And the nicest part of all is that these new papers are as washable as the cat—or your best set of china.

There are some new ways to use wallpaper, too—although the usual manner of papering all four walls is still used a great deal. For instance, some of the decorators are papering just one wall (the smallest surface) in a pattern, with the other three walls painted in the same general tone. Again, if you like, you may use a simple wallpaper pattern around windows and doors in an otherwise solidly-colored room. Panels in painted doors are lovely filled in with some design in wallpaper.

In addition to these, there are endless new and lovely inspirations in any woman's magazine. And when you're all finished with papering, don't forget to gather up wallpaper scraps in one hand and stray wastebaskets and boxes in the other—and finish up by putting a fine new dress of one onto the other. If you've still any wallpaper left, give it to the walls of some of your clothes closets which are probably dying for a little brightening up.
