### New Home Demonstration Agent Announces Meetings

A series of Food Preservation demonstrations will be given during July by Miss Julia Bennett, county home demonstration agent, and Miss Lucy Case, extension specialist in foods and nutrition, from Oregon State College. The demonstration will consist of methods of canning by tin can, glass jars, frozen pack; the use of the hot water bath, pressure cooker, and open kettle. Various types of foods will be demonstrated, such as meat, a non-acid vegetable, fruit, and the method of canning strawberries or other berries in order to prevent floating. Instruction will also be given on the use of the home-made drier for drying fruits and vegetables in one's own kitchen. The demonstrations will be given from 10:00 a. m. till 3:30 p. m. in the following communities: Powers at the Fellowship Clubhouse, July 13; Fairview Grange Hall, July 14; Green Dell at the home of Mrs. Edna Middleton, July 15; Allegany at Nowlin Hall, July 19; Catching Inlet, July 20; Dew Valley Clubhouse, July 21. Anyone interested in these demonstrations is welcome to attend.

### Swift & Co. Files Appeal

Swift and company, in an appeal filed with the United States circuit court of appeals Tuesday charged Secretary of Agriculture Wallace with attempting to drive it out of competition.

The allegation was made in the company's appeal from Secretary Wallace's order that it "cease and desist" from the "unjustly discriminatory" credit, discount and weight practices.

The company, charged in ten separate counts with violation of the packers and stockyards act, opposed the findings as contrary to the evidence presented. The whole proceeding against the company, the appeal set forth, was a denial of a "full and fair hearing" as required by the packers and stockyard act.

Secretary Wallace, the appeal stated, permitted a small group of competitors to assist in the prosecution, and the proceeding was "not in the public interest, but instead was a proceeding instituted and conducted for the sole benefit of a small group of purveyors."
