### City Council Session Held Tuesday Evening (Continued from Page One)

Henry street near Twelfth, was referred to the water committee for a report at the July 18 meeting.

The city council authorized to make a contract with the rodeo company, which is to put on a show at the ball park during the Golden West Days celebration.

Ralph E. Nosler stated to the council that the property owners on Taylor street—the highway—between Second and Third, would not object to the full width paving program as proposed, but those at the north end of the block would like to have the six feet inside the walk, vacated as a street so that there would be no danger in the future that their walks would be torn up for further widening of the street. It was pointed out by the city engineer that the sidewalk width along there is set at ten feet, but as long as it is not business property there is no possibility that the six-foot sidewalk would ever be moved from the outside to the inside of the ten foot strip.

The marshal was instructed to stop the parking of cars in the street be-

tween the Ralph Nosler home and Folsom's Grocery. Progress through the street and entrance to garages is often impossible because of cars parked there.

Ole Paulson asked the council to continue the widening of Hall street, from Front street to the city limits, by a PWA project, so that it could be graveled in another year or two and provide more space for pedestrian travel.
