

No Racketeering Fund

It is provided that labor organiza ons shall not make charges or levy dues or fines in excess of legitimate equirements. In other words, the hill declares it to be unlawful for a labor organization to collect money from the workers to be used for illegal purposes. Another direct blow is aimed at racketeering in the provision that a member of a labor or ganization shall be entitled at all easonable times to inspect the books and records of his own organization.
