Mystery, Novelty and Adventure In Richard Dix's "Blind Alibi" At Liberty Theatre Saturday and Sunday How Clever Dogs Are Trained to Guide the Blind Shown in Story Of A Brother's Sacrifice And His Romance Amid Perils Starring Richard Dix in one of the most unusual roles of his career, RKO Radio's "Blind Alibi" has a plot in which a sculptor who essays burglary as an amateur detective, and pretending to be blind, has a well-trained dog to aid him, and finally becomes involved with a gang of killers and goes to jail—all in the name of brotherly loyalty. The purpose behind all these adventures is the recovery of a packet of letter written by the sculptor's sister, which have fallen into the hands of blackmailers. With Paris and Los Angeles as the locales of the story, the settings range from French studios and hotels to a huge California museum, for which thousands of rare tapestries, paintings and statues were assembled. Many sequences between Dix and his dog vividly reveal the methods used to train blind men and their canine companions in working together. Dix, who has specialized in powerful dramatic roles, is supported by Whitney Bourne as his romantic interest and by Eduardo Ciannelli as the blackmailer-in-chief. An important role is played by "Ace, the Wonder Dog." Paul Gullfoyle, Frances Mercer, Richard Lane, Jack Arnold, Frank M. Thomas, Solly Ward, Walter Miller and other noted players are in the cast. Lew Landers directed the production by Cliff Reid.
