H. A. Minter Writes On Labor Conditions Here

(Continued from Page One)

The A. F. of L. petitioned the Board with a majority of more than 2 to 1 for the bargaining power. To date the Board has taken its own good time for obvious reasons, to give the C. I. O. time to gain sufficient strength, if possible, to secure the majority of men working in the Plywood plant.

Every dishonorable and unfair means, other than outright violence, known to radical labor, has been used in trying to coerce and intimidate men to join the C. I. O. A constant stream of lying propaganda, both by word of mouth and printed matter, is being used to bring this about.

Personal letters to A. F. of L. members charge their leaders with deliberately deceiving them regarding their rights and privileges. Some of these claims are that the C. I. O. has control of the wood working industry and that they have the power to blacklist and prevent from securing work elsewhere every man that does not belong to their union. Also that we do not have a legal working agreement; that the NLRB will not grant us the bargaining agency because we are a company-controlled union and that we owe our existence to unfair labor practices, and numerous other equally untrue assertions. As recognized leader of the A. F.

of L. in the Plywood, a campaign of slander is directed toward myself, attacking my character and in various ways endeavoring to discredit me in the eyes of the community. Men and women whom I do not know, and to my knowledge I have in no way harmed, hurl filthy and insulting remarks at me when I walk about the streets.

When the wave of C. I. O. disorder threatened to close the industry here, as it has done wherever it has asserted itself, I did what I could to oppose their communistic methods of dictatorship. When the time came to openly oppose, I took the weapon nearest my hand, the machinery they discarded, and with the support of honest men succeeded in keeping the plant operating.

There are many local boys in the C. I. O. ranks, swept off their feet by clever propagandists, who still believe that they are right. But there are outside influences, men with no other interests here than to stir up trouble; these are not to be excused. They contribute nothing to the upkeep and up-building of the community.

No doubt this letter will bring down the wrath of the C. I. O. leaders upon my head; whether or no, it is time that the town of Coquille wakes up to the fact that there is a sinister organization at work undermining every principle of decency and honor. Yours for a peaceful and law-abiding community.
