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### Review of New Books At Coquille Library

Among new books received in the Coquille Library this week, is the "Importance of Living," by Lin You-lung. This is one of the best non-fiction sellers in the United States. It deals in an interesting manner with the arts of loafing, of conversation, of smoking, of travel, of enjoying food, of reading, of appreciation of nature, with the creative impulse, and above all, the importance of all our daily habits. The book distills for the western world the Chinese philosophy of 3000 years, in the hope that it may bring help to men and women who have not yet learned, as the Chinese have, that the meaning of life lies in living itself.

Other new books are "Free Land," by Rose Wilder Lane; "From Hoop-skirt to Nudity," by Carrie A. Hall; "Adventures of David Grayson," by Thos. Fogarty and "The Valliant Wife," Margaret Wilson.

Another group of books by Oregon authors was a gift from the Business and Professional Women's Club. The group includes "Marcus Whitman, M. D.," by Clifford Drury; "Good Medicine," written and illustrated by Chas. Russell, an Oregon Cowboy; "Lucretia Ann and the Oregon Trail," a children's book by Ruth Flowhead; "Birds of the Northwest," by Nellie Blanchan, and "Pahang," by Willard C. Bush, of Salem, Ore., who tells his own story in this book. The author describes the conditions which are destroying the trees, quells quick action and cleans up things generally. His experiences on his rubber plantation on the Malay Peninsula and later as manager of two others in northern Johore and on the Straits of Sumatra, make an exciting story. His deft style makes one feel the heat, the thrill—often the shiver—of his hairbreadth escapes from tigers, pythons and elephants.

#### Receiving Undeserved Publicity

The Coquille police, two of them—Lewis English and Frank McCreary—were receiving undeserved publicity over the air yesterday when KOOS broadcast statements that were made in five letters read to the council Monday evening. Undeserved, because the council referred those letters to a special committee for investigation and if it is found the letters were written with a desire to "get even" with the officers, or in the hope of securing a place on the force, they will be of no effect and would better be left unpublished.

One of the letters was in the form of a petition, signed by H. V. McGrew and other, asking that Mr. English be removed because he did not arrest a man for profanity on the street. Another protested his remaining on the force because he stopped to talk religion when he should have been attending to his official duties. Another stated that the two officers went outside the city while on official duty, in company with other persons, and various other complaints were made. Signers of the four letters were R. C. Train, Kermit Shaw, Lee Goodman, Ray Woodyard and Bob Collier.

Upon motion of Councilman Seeley a committee was named by the mayor to investigate the charges. The councilmen appointed were O. L. Wood, Everett Seeley and Dr. R. F. Milne.

#### Large Crowds Hear Evangelist

Evangelist Henry McAlister spoke to a full house every night at the Assembly of God services, which closed Monday evening, undoubtedly the largest revival crowds seen in Coquille in recent times, average attendance probably being 300. Rev. Franklin W. Smith, national chairman of the Open Bible Standard churches, was in attendance until Sunday evening. He and the local pastor are brothers. The father of the two minister brothers, Chester O. Smith, who is chief engineer for the Del Monte properties in Del Monte, California, was also visiting.
