Mrs. Howard Hatcher returned to her home in Coquille after a several days' visit at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Barker.

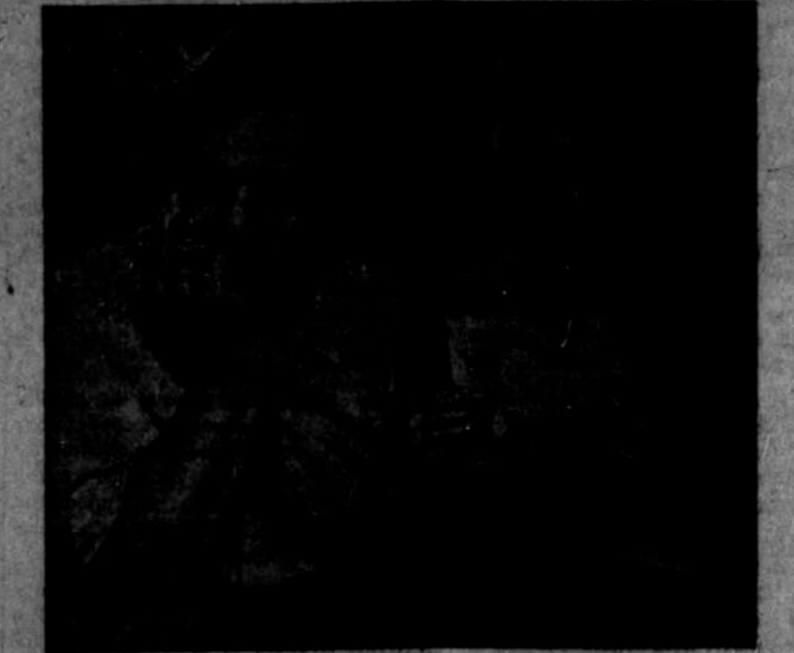
At a recent school board meeting, it was decided to open the Myrtle Point public schools Tuesday, September 6, the day following Labor Day.

FISHTRAP DRAINAGE DISTRICT NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS. Sealed proposals will be received by the Fishtrap Drainage District of Coos County, Oregon, until the hour of 10:00 A. M. on Thursday, August 18, 1938, at the office of Harry A. Slack, First National Bank Building, Coquille, Oregon, for the repair, improvement and reconstruction of the ditch and drainage system of said District.

Said repairs, improvement and reconstruction will consist of cleaning approximately 2940 lineal feet of ditch to a bottom width of 5 feet and an average depth of 2 feet, cleaning approximately 640 lineal feet of ditch to a bottom width of 4 feet and an average depth of 2 feet. There will be approximately 760 cubic yards of excavating and approximately 640 cubic yards of backfilling, in addition to the cleaning of the ditch as aforesaid. There will also be required approximately 31,900 feet of old growth red cedar lumber, 10,000 feet of No. 2 fir planks, 260 red cedar posts 6x6-8, 1700 lb. of spikes, 1,000 lb. 1/2 inch round iron and 3 cubic yards of horse manure, for the construction by the bidder of a red cedar box or drain approximately 236 feet long, inside measurements 5 feet x 4 feet. Plans and Specifications are on file at the office of Harry A. Slack as above mentioned, and bidder may submit proposals on alternate plans furnished by themselves.

Bidders' proposals must be for furnishing all labor and materials, and be for the job complete, and must be accompanied by a certified check or a Bidders' Bond in an amount not less than 5 per cent of the total amount of the proposal, as a guarantee for the execution of the contract and the furnishing of the required bonds in case the contract is awarded to the bidder. Said 5 per cent to be forfeited to the District should the bidder fail to enter into contract for completion of the work if the bidder is awarded the award of contract will be required to furnish a bond for the full amount of the contract.

No bidder may withdraw his bid after the hour set for opening thereof or before award of contract, unless said award is delayed for a period exceeding 30 days.
