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Meetings Continue at The Tabernacle

A large congregation heard Rev. Arnold C. Weston, missionary to the west coast of Africa, in his opening message at the Gospel Tabernacle (Assembly of God), Tuesday night, when he spoke on the subject, "How a church grew from one village and eight members to seventy-five villages and twelve hundred members in four years." Wednesday night he spoke on "The African's World," or "The World as the African sees it." The message was a study in African witchcraft and demonology.

Thursday evening's subject will be, "The Advance into Togoland." "Supernatural Guidance and Provision," is the method of contacting and evangelizing the naked and fierce tribesmen and the results. Friday evening the subject will be, "The Horrors of the Inquisition repeated in African Persecution of Today."

Sunday morning the subject is, "Modern Missionary Methods in the Light of the New Testament." Warfare in missionary ranks today is shown. Mrs. Weston claims that the issues at stake in the modern controversy over methods of administering missions are as great as those which were involved in the Great Reformation of Luther. Sunday evening, the closing message, "The Challenge of Unoccupied Territory in Asia and Africa."

Next week, beginning Tuesday night, Aug. 16, Evangelist N. W. Jennings of old Virginia, a nationally known evangelist and pastor, will, with his party, begin revival services in the Tabernacle. Meetings will be every night except Sunday. Mr. Jennings spent nine years in Los Angeles, Calif., as pastor of the First Brethren church. He was also pastor of the First Brethren Church at Turlock, California, for eight years. Battery Cases Before Justice Barton. Earl Floyd Phillips, arrested here last Thursday for operating a car without a driver's license, was fined \$25 by Justice Barton and is serving the fine out in the county jail at \$2.00 per day. Phillips is the young man who was recently released from the pen where he had served a sentence as the result of killing two women in Empire when driving his truck while intoxicated. His driver's license was automatically revoked for a year when he was convicted of manslaughter and Secretary of State Snell has now revoked it for an additional year.

Meck Gant, arrested last Thursday on an assault and battery charge, pleaded not guilty in Justice Barton's court here last Thursday and appeared for trial on Monday this week when he was found guilty and fined \$50. not able to attend the tour in the Coquille valley, two irrigation field meetings will be held in the northern part of the county on Wednesday, August 17, as follows: Nell Barnes farm on South Coos River at 10:00 a. m. Preston Monson farm in Templeton district, 2:00 p. m.

Irrigation is proving profitable on several farms in this county. Because of the need for additional moisture during the summer months and to prevent the usual drop in production in dairy herds, it is believed that it would be profitable on other farms, Mr. Jenkins stated. Unusual interest has been shown this year in the

possibility of controlling the moisture through irrigation, and this year and the field meetings have been arranged to provide an opportunity to observe the various types of equipment used under different conditions.

Arthur King, extension specialist in irrigation work from the state college, will be present to discuss recent developments in irrigation. Harold Ewalt, from the dairy department, will explain results obtained from irrigated pastures grazed by the college herd. Information will be available on securing water rights, on the cost of equipment and power, and on co-operative loans from representatives of the office of the state engineer, of equipment companies, the power company, and the Farm Security Administration.
