C. of C. Approves Highway 42 Change

Acting on a request from the city council which acted in the same manner at the Monday evening session, the directors of the Chamber of Commerce, at their Tuesday noon session, instructed the secretary to address a request to the State Highway Commission asking that when the Hall street widening program is completed that Highway 42 be routed north on Hall to Third and then west to the Marshfield highway opposite Folsom's Grocery. It will probably be six months before the change can be made but before that time the widening of Hall and on Third for a block will have been completed.

For those not familiar with the highway designation, 42, it is the Middle Fork road from Roseburg, through Myrtle Point, which now turns west at the Fitzgerald Service Station. The re-routing will cause traffic from the east to miss a portion of the local automobile traffic and will tend to relieve congestion on Taylor street, from the Fuhrman's Pharmacy corner to the Coquille Service Station.

Supply For Weeks Yet

Unless the fall rains should be delayed until late fall, the city's water supply will be O. K. It was reported at the council session Monday that the level of the water back of the big dam at Coquille is still about three days. Water used in the preceding ten weeks had amounted to 23,000,000 gallons, and the estimate of the remaining supply was 26,000,000 gallons.
