**Two 4-H Judging Teams**

Win Trips Outside

Two 4-H club livestock judging teams, one from the Arago Dairy club including Clyde Lillie, Junior Gultstrom, and Gerald Lillie, and the other from the Myrtle Point Dairy Club including Frank Trigg, Phillip Bartlett and Ernest Davenport, tied for high honors with an average score of 430 each in a judging contest conducted in connection with a judging tour held in northern Curry county on August 19 and 20, according to results tabulated in the county agricultural agent's office. These teams will have an opportunity of representing Coos county in the 4-H Livestock judging contests at the Oregon state fair and at the Pacific International livestock exposition as a result of the scores won.

The judging team, representing the Gaylord Sheep Club, including John Neal, Jr., Elwood Young, and Glenn Daniels, placed third in the contest with an average score of 315 and the team from the Four Mile Sheep Club, including Gerald Fraser, Opal McBurney and Clifford Foster placed fourth with a score of 301.

The judging tour and outing has become an annual event in this section of the state. In addition to practice judging, various phases of livestock and crop management are discussed. The farms visited this year were in northern Curry county and southern Coos where arrangements were made by R. M. Knox, Curry county agent.

The first meeting was held at the H. S. Cadman farm, north of Langlois, where Dorothy Cadman and Ralph Cope gave a demonstration in fitting and showing a dairy calf. Following an out-door lunch at Floras creek, the group met at the Phillip Cope farm where a class of Jersey cows was judged and instruction given by the leaders. A class of market hogs were judged at the John Kreutzer farm. The group camped over night on the H. H.
