OMETIMES amusing, so "Crime School," the Warner-Bros.

picture opening at the Roxy Theatre conight, contains a powerful indict-ment of unthinking, brutal, out-moded methods of dealing with juvenile

Effectively utilizing the talents of the six New York boys who be famous in both stage and screen ver-sions of "Dead End," as well as such adult players as Humphrey Boand Gale Page, the latter a beaut ewcomer to the screen from radio, the new Warner picture makes a strong case for its basic theme—that he old type of boys' reformatory is

in fact a "Crime School."

That he was a good choice for director s proven by the picture itself, and therefore it is not surprising to learn that he spent his own boyhood in an environment similar to the home neighborhood of the boy characters in the picture.

Another objection to the engine report is that the additional storage would not provide much more than 15 million additional gallons and when the dam was raised the city would have to begin at once to seek a new source of supply. The cost of raising the dam and other expenses incidental to the job is estimated at wer \$30,000.

Nor was the North Fork source, t be secured by pumping the water to an elevation of 627 feet and letting it run down Rink creek to the reoir, given very serious consideration by those who looked at it. The North Fork is flowing, but the

pool from which it was proposed to pump looked stagnant, and there is uch stock above that point which

has access to the river.

If Coquille must purify its water as would be necessary if taken from that stream, it might better put in a purifying plant and pump directly from the river above town. That is what will be done if the town ever attains the size of a city and the water pure as that of Medford which come from the base of Mt. Pitt without ever being exposed to the light.
