Catching Slough Bridge Started

Actual construction has been started on the new bridge which will span Catching Slough on Coos River, near Marshfield. It was started Wednesday afternoon, giving employment to a large number of skilled and unskilled workers. The bridge, to be built by the state's highway department at an estimated cost of \$91,500, will be 932 feet long, including standard pile trestle approaches and a 172-foot swing span of structural steel. The Public Works Administration allotted a grant of \$41,1717 for this project.
