Marine Corps Seeks Recruits

The U. S. Marine Corps is to have one thousand more enlisted men by end of fiscal year, according to information received from Postmaster Marvin O. Hawkins. Applicants enlisted to fill these vacancies will serve as replacements sent to China, Guam, Philippine Islands, Hawaii, and to battleships, heavy cruisers, and airplane carriers of the United States fleet. To qualify, applicants must be young men at least 18 years of age; unmarried citizens of the United States; in good physical condition; between sixty-four and seventy-four inches in height. Accepted applicants must be of good moral character and must furnish letters of recommendation as to their standing. Interesting literature describing service and opportunities with the U. S.
