Riverton School

On Labor Day, Sept. 5, the boys and girls of the Riverton Grade and High School will outline their course for another year's labor at their respective schools. On that day will be held the annual registration. It would make the work of scheduling classes and the ordering of additional books much more convenient if every one who expects to enter school could be there on the first day to get registered. School will be dismissed as soon as all the routine registration work is done, probably by noon.

Riverton is especially fortunate this year in having back all but one of its eight teachers. The single change is in the home economics and English departments in the high school. Miss Gale Hufford, who taught those courses last year, has accepted a position at Yoncalla. Miss Sarah Margaret Nye will take over Miss Hufford's classes. Miss Nye is a graduate from the Coquille High School and Oregon State College. While at O. S. C. she did very commendable work in her major field of home economics. She has had years of experience in large quantity cooking, which very well equips her to take care of the school cafeteria.

The other high school teachers who will return to Riverton are Miss Elda Gilman, Carroll Ryerant and Wayne Johnson, principal.

In the grade school James Leonard will again teach the seventh and eighth grades; Miss Opal Robison, fifth and sixth; Mrs. Joyce Owen, third and fourth; and Miss Ann Allard, first and second. Mr. Robison acts as principal of the grade school also.

Mrs. D. P. Jenkins' term expired this year on the high school board. The voters of the Riverton Union High school district were so pleased with her administration in the past that a petition was immediately presented for her nomination and she was unanimously re-elected to serve again. The other members of the Union High School board are: Frank Van Leuven, chairman; Joe Nilsen, Mrs. William Carlson and Conrad Borgard.

The grade school board consists of Joe Nilsen, chairman; Mrs. Clara Jeffery, who was also unanimously elected to serve again, and Mr. Fetch, who was prevailed upon to accept the election to complete the term of Randall Johnson, who resigned to accept a position as janitor and bus driver for the school district.

Several new courses have been added to the offerings of the Riverton high school this year. Socio-economic problems, world geography and civilizations and orientation are three new courses in the social science series which will be offered for the first time at Riverton. A course in algebra will be added, also, for upperclassmen who expect to use the higher mathematics in their college work.

Other previously-offered courses which will be taught are typing I, domestic science I, domestic science III, English II, English III, bookkeeping I, health, biology, and agriculture I to IV inclusive.

Due to the fortunate selection of teachers and the alteration of subjects, the Riverton High School has been able to offer 33 choices in subjects every two years. This is as wide a range as many city high schools find it possible to present.

Due to present financial conditions, the board deemed it desirable to postpone some improvements in the building that they had hoped to make this year. However, they felt that the need for more adequate lighting in the grade school part of the building was rather urgent. A new lighting system was installed this summer. The lights were placed only in the most necessary sections of the rooms but were installed in such a way that additional drops could be added without undoing any of the work that had been done.

Riverton has taken full advantage of the WPA project in Coquille which is repairing, cleaning, and shellacking districts-owned books, both library and text. The charge is only for materials, from 5c to 12c per book. Several weeks ago Mr. Robinson took a trailer load of seven boxes of books to the court house where they are being worked on under Mrs. Mulkey's supervision. Mr. Robinson has been informed that all of the text books will be ready for use before school convenes and that the library books will be completed soon after school opens.

The books which were not taken in will all be shellacked by the teachers and pupils at school so that every usable book should be in first class condition soon after school starts.

Several additions will be made to the high school library, before school opens, as a result of \$30 worth of books which were purchased from last year's budget too late for delivery

NOTICE OF ASSESSMENT

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 400 passed by the Common Council of the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon, on the 29th day of August, 1933, and entitled, "AN ORDINANCE levying and declaring an assessment against the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land benefited by the construction of a sewer system on Eleventh Street east of Holly Street for a distance of 393 feet, in the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon, according to the apportionment of benefits adopted and filed on the 1st day of August, 1933, by the City Recorder and Committee on Streets, directing the City Recorder to enter a statement thereof in the Docket of City Liens and declaring an emergency," an assessment was levied and declared against the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land benefited by the construction of such sewer, all within the boundaries of the assessment district created for the purpose of said sewer construction, which assessment district and the boundaries thereof are described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the center lines of Eleventh Street and Holly Street, in the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon; running thence North 30 feet; thence East 62 feet to the southwest corner of Lot 12, Block 3, Supplemental Plat to Academy Addition in said City of Coquille; thence North 100 feet; thence East 370 feet to the northeast corner of Lot 20 of Block 3; thence South 278 feet; thence West 432 feet to the center of Holly Street; thence North 148 feet to the place of beginning.

A statement of said assessment was entered in the Docket of City Liens on the 29th day of August, 1933, and the same and said Ordinance with said assessment thereto attached containing the names of the owners, description of property assessed and amount of assessment against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land is on file with the City Recorder and subject to inspection by all persons interested and are hereby made a part of this notice by reference.

The whole cost of said construction is the sum of \$620.50.
