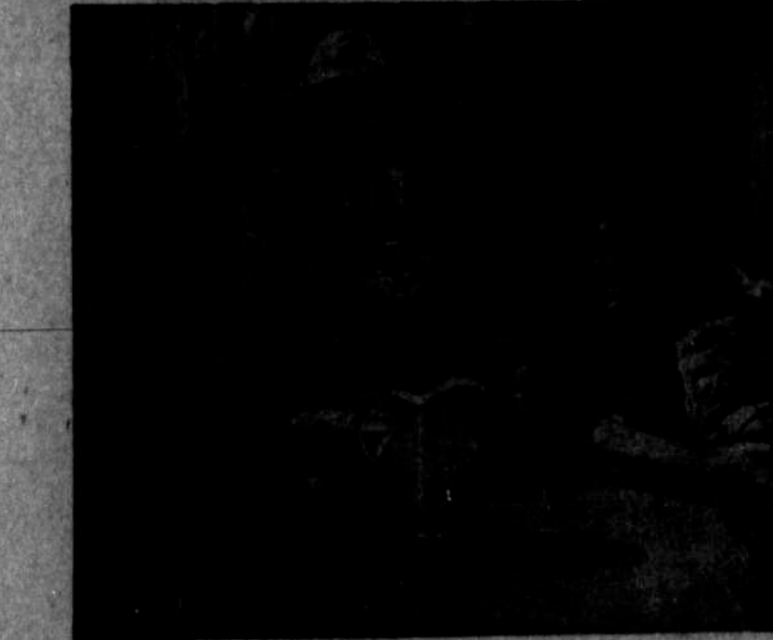


Sea Life In Alaska Basis Of Film Saga At The Roxy Sunday, Monday, Tuesday



George Raft and Henry Fonda will be seen as a pair of seagoing comrades in the new Alaskan romance, "Spawns of the North," when it opens next Sunday at the Roxy Theatre. Dorothy Lamour completes the trio starring in the production.

"**LORD JEFF**," dramatic story of the training of boys for the British Merchant Marine, teaming Freddie Bartholomew and Mickey Rooney, is the latest production of the Liberty Theatre for a three-day run. Placed in the Russell Cotes Nautical School, one of the 120 odd institutions operated in England by the Barnardo Homes which trains orphans for varied callings, it tells a story of boyish loyalties and regeneration against a background of the British school.

Freddie Bartholomew plays a youngster who, the tool of a pair of swindlers who pass him off as "Lord Geoffrey," heir to a title, gets in trouble with the authorities, but because of his innocence is classed as an orphan and sent to the nautical school.

Rooney plays the Irish student petty officer to whom he is assigned. Freddie's emotions run the gamut from hate and desire to escape and finally to loyalty. The boys finish as graduates, assigned to the liner Queen

Mary. Dramatic highlights include the boy's first hatred of the institution, the fight between Freddie and Mickey, the winning of a boat race, the escape from the school, the return back, and the final triumph aboard the steamer.

Sam Wood, who directed "Navy Blue and Gold," and who directed Jackie Coogan in his first feature picture, directed "Lord Jeff," with several hundred boys, either British or of British descent, playing nautical students. Technical advisers from the Barnardo Homes and the Queen Mary aided in authentic detail.

Players include Charles Coburn as Captain Briggs, Herbert Mundin as Mr. Jelks, Gale Sondergaard as the feminine swindler, Terry Kilburn, Peter Lawford and Walter Tetley as student companions of Freddie and Mickey, and also Peter Ellis, George Zucco, Matthew Boulton, John Burton, Emma Dunn, Monty Woolley and Walter Kingsford.

permit a presentation of their names at the caucus is not known to the Sentinel. They have all had experience in city affairs and the city can ill afford to dispense with their services.

Geo. Bryant, as watchdog of the treasury, has frequently called a halt when unnecessary expenditures were proposed by citizens who were looking at their proposal only from the benefit angle.

Mr. Harrington has probably paid more attention to the city streets than any preceding chairman of the street committee and is well posted on the city's needs in that line.

Everett Seeley, as chairman of the council, has presided frequently in Dr. Rankin's absence, capably and efficiently. His name has been suggested for mayor and unless he remains firm in his declaration to retire from participation in city affairs he probably would be named for head of the city government.

At any rate it's time for the voters to consider the matter of city officials and be ready in less than three weeks to name candidates for office who will serve the city well.
