Judge Brand, who held the first session of circuit court here Tuesday, after the August vacation, revoked the parole of Jack Grove, who had been given a year's sentence some months ago for stealing a revolver. Grove pleaded guilty to forgery, having signed the name of his uncle to checks, and the judge sentenced him to five years in the pen.

John Wesley Nash, also sentenced to two years in the pen on a forgery charge, in July, had execution of his sentence suspended and he was placed on probation for five years. He was given a reasonable time to make good on the checks and if they are not paid the probation order will be revoked, Judge Brand informed him.
