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**Council Decides To Raise The Dam**

from the accompanying tables of capital and annual costs.

These tables show:

Capital cost of Rink Creek Dam enlargements	\$45,400
Of which the City would pay	18,400
And W. P. A.	27,000
Annual cost in excess of that now in effect	800
Capital cost of No. Fk. Coquille pumping project	50,800
Of which the City would pay	37,800
And W. P. A.	13,000
Annual cost in excess of that now in effect	\$ 4,728

The method of arriving at the required storage is based on a population of 5000 using an average of 120 gallons per capita per day for 150 days. This will allow a maximum rate of 150 gal. per capita per day.

Total gal. required for 150 days	90,000,000
Of which natural inflow during 150 days	18,000,000
Storage required	72,000,000
Present storage to elevation 392.5	45,000,000
Storage to elev. 404	77,000,000
Additional provided	32,000,000

The plan by which it is believed the work can best be done is to use as much relief labor as possible furnished by W. P. A. The City should furnish a bulldozer to spread and compact the clay on the front face and to spread that on the back face. The clay can be secured from the north abutment. The City should also supply trucks, or else dump cars that can run on a movable track. Either would be filed by hand labor, dumped on the dam and spread with the dozer.

The sandstone fill will come mainly from the new spillway excavation on the south abutment which will be made wide enough to provide sufficient material. The concrete lining from the old spillway will be broken and dumped on the back side of the dam. The new spillway will have a long low overflow wall with crest at elev. 404 and only sufficient paving to prevent the overpour from scouring; otherwise the spillway will not be lined.

The gate tower will be raised and reinforced by struts on the inside to take the additional earth load. Some retaining walls will be built around its base to keep the sluice pipe open. A cut-off wall is to be provided below the dam to recover all the seepage.

Before the road becomes impassable sand, gravel, and cement for 110 cu. yds. of concrete and lumber for forms should be hauled in and stored. While the City's portion of the estimate is \$18,400 it would be best to provide \$20,000 as the City's share of the cost of this improvement, and \$3500 additional for replacing the old remaining wood pipe in the transmission line from Rink Creek to the city.

We have considered the matter of having the project built by contract under P. W. A. but believe the delay involved would very likely preclude any work being done this winter.

I am obliged to be away for about a week which prevents my bringing this report in person. It, however, virtually explains itself. As soon as we receive your acceptance of this program we will proceed at once with the preparation of plans for the work.
