The plan by which it is believed the work can best be done is to use as much relief labor as posible furnished by W. P. A. The City should furnish a bulldozer to spread and compact the clay on the front face and to pread that on the back face. The clay can be secured from the north

abutment. The City should also supply trucks, or else dump cars that can run on a movable track. Either would be filed by hand labor, dumped on the dam and spread with the dozer.

The sandstone fill will come mainly from the new spillway excavation on the south abutment which will be made wide enough to provide suffi-cient material. The concrete lining from the old spillway will be broker and dumped on the back side of the dam. The new spillway will have a long low overflow wall with crest at elev, 404 and only sufficient paving to prevent the overpour from scouring; otherwise the spillway will not

The gate tower will be raised and reinforced by struts on the inside to take the additional earth load. Some Raise The Dam retaining walls will be built around its base to keep the sluice pipe open A cut-off wall is to be provided below the dam to recover all the seepage.
