



Coquille friends were shocked to hear of the accident last Friday in which little Ricard Perry, aged six and a half, was fatally injured. The boy, who moved to Lafayette, Oregon about two weeks ago with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Perry, was playing on the highway crossing near his home in company with othe children. Halfway across, he hesitated, uncertain whether to go on across, then stepped directly in the path of a car driven by a neighbor. His head was struck by the headlight and the body was dragged some distance before the car could stop.

Richard was taken to the McMinnville Hospital, where he died within an hour from basal skull injuries. The Perrys had been Coquillé resi-

the needles eye and yours

Your eye must see the needle's eye clearly if you're to get the thread through it at the first try. And threading the needle is not the only part of sewing that needs clear seeing. So when you sew after the lamps are lighted, be sure that the light is right for such work. Sewing in poor light causes eye strain, may cause irreparable damage if persisted in.

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
