Coquille High School

The first student council meeting of the year was held Friday noon at the high school. The organization, comprised of the student body officers and a representative from each class, decided to issue student body tickets for the entire term and not for a single semester as had been previously discussed. The tickets, selling at \$1.50, will include the price of a subscription to the school paper but will not include payment for the annual, as they did last year.

The Girl's League council held a supper meeting Wednesday evening in the Home Economics room of the high school to discuss plans for the coming year. Margaret Smith, who was elected to the office of president at mid-term last year, will resume her duties in that office for the coming semester.

The freshman and sophomore girls enjoyed their first athletic event Tuesday under the direction of Miss Schaeffer. A short baseball game was played during the noon hour, with the sophomores victorious when the bell rang, with a score of five to three.

Instructions were issued to students Tuesday preparatory to the first fire drill of the semester which will be held at an early date. The fire escape on the south end of the building was renewed during the summer, making it safe for use in practice this year.

The high school teachers are forming a group for social recreation among the faculty for the coming school year. Geo. Fuller, Miss Conn and Miss Barker compose the committee in charge of the arrangements. School will be dismissed all day Friday in order that students may enjoy the Coos County Fair.

A number of improvements in the school building during the summer months make many of the rooms in the high school much more attractive. The floors of the library, office and commercial room have been sanded and varnished.

Forty new pedestal desks have been installed in room 24, the senior home room. The chemical laboratory has been moved into the old supply room and chemistry laboratory desks have been permanently installed. The class room adjacent has been made more habitable with sanded floors.

The new oil furnace has made more space available in the basement and lessened the clutter and noise necessitated by the use of wood in heating the building.

Three new Underwood typewriters have been added to the equipment of the commercial room, and a number of new books have been received by the school library.

To offset the darkness caused in the north end of the hall, created by the addition of the new gym at that end of the building, a new skylight has been cut in the roof to light the upper north hall, while three new lights in the lower north hall being in some light from the commercial room.

The cafeteria this year will function under management of Miss Conn, the home economics instructor.

Richard Perry Fatally Injured

Coquille friends were shocked to hear of the accident last Friday in which little Ricard Perry, aged six and a half, was fatally injured. The boy, who moved to Lafayette, Oregon, about two weeks ago with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Perry, was playing on the highway crossing near his home in company with other children. Halfway across, he hesitated, uncertain whether to go on across, then stepped directly in the path of a car driven by a neighbor. His head was struck by the headlight and the body was dragged some distance before the car could stop.

Richard was taken to the McMinnville Hospital, where he died within an hour from basal skull injuries.

The Perrys had been Coquille residents for the past fourteen years, and Mr. Perry had been employed until recently at Smith-Wood Products plant. The sympathy of their many friends here goes out to the family.

Richard is survived, in addition to his parents, by two brothers, Lee, aged thirteen, and Rodney, ten, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Wilson, of Coquille.
