Myrtle Shop Changes Name
In their quest for a more distinctive name for their rapidly growing business, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. H. Oerding who maintain a myrtlewood factory and retail shop on the Marshfield highway just outside of the city, have registered the new name, The Myrtle Burl, by which the retail shop will be known hereafter.

Mrs. E. J. Throckmorton, nee Marjorie McClellan, left last Friday for her home in Seattle after a week's visit here at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred McClellan. When she arrived she found that her mother had gone over to Grants Pass where Mr. McClellan is mining, and she had intended to spend some time here, but a wire from Mr. Throckmorton brought word that her application for an office position with the West Coast Lumbermen's association had been accepted and she had to leave sooner than expected in order to take the position.

A large sign, which greets the north-bound tourist, has been erected near the Cunningham railroad crossing, while the roof signs have been repainted with the shop's new name.

Adult Education Classes
The adult education classes began Monday, Sept. 12. They are being held temporarily in the Washington school. A general course in English usage and mechanics of grammar is being taught. A very interesting forum on social problems was held Tuesday evening with students reporting on up-to-date articles on pertinent questions. This was followed by a discussion period.

For the benefit of the hundreds of tourists who stop each summer, Mr. and Mrs. Oerding have added several lines to their regular stock, such as chollas cactus gifts from the Mojave Desert, Zebra wood gifts from South America, redwood gifts and carved animals and yew-wood novelties. New gifts and souvenirs in the myrtlewood line have also been added, such as myrtle perfume, specially designed finger-fitting pens and pencils and the locally famed carved animals created by Bob Harbison.

Some work is being done in public speaking and Mrs. Woodcock, who is director, hopes that the demand for this subject and dramatics will merit a special evening for those subjects alone. In case there are those desiring it, a class in Latin will be started. These classes begin at seven o'clock and continue for three hours. They are held nightly, Monday through Friday. It is to be hoped that enough interest can be aroused in them to justify starting other courses. This is Coquille's opportunity to take advantage of money granted for such a worthwhile purpose. Everyone over sixteen years is welcome.

A feature which attracts many easterners each season is the large myrtle tree growing on the hillside adjacent to the shop. The tree, estimated by Peter Johnson, long time resident of the neighborhood, to be well over a hundred years old, has been the object of hundreds of tourists' cameras each season. The Oerding's have been successful in transplanting numerous small myrtles on the nearby slope.
