Rally Day At Pioneer Church Sunday

Sunday, October 2, is Rally Day for Pioneer Methodist Sunday school and church. All of this week the regular attendants of the Sunday school are putting forth special efforts to insure a record attendance, exceeding the highest number reported last year.

Rev. H. L. Graybeal is now acting as superintendent. He has announced that special Rally Day emblems will be distributed to everyone Sunday morning. The service will begin with a general assembly of all departments in the main auditorium where a short program will be given. Then announcements will be made concerning the changes in some departments and class rooms, and the new teachers will also be introduced. Special merit badges will be awarded to those who bring new pupils.

The Rally Day emphasis is also being stressed in regard to the morning church services at 11 o'clock.

He expects to be away from three to five weeks. He has announced a special revival sermon for next Sunday evening on the "Unpardonable Sin." Mrs. R. D. E. Smith will be in charge of the Tabernacle in his absence.
