Arego Girl Wins

Chosen as the outstanding 4-H Club boy and girl in Coos county by a local judging committee, Maxine Rackleff, of Arego, and Robert Hooks, of Marshfield, will go to Portland as guests of The First National Bank of Portland for three days during the Pacific International Livestock Exposition. They were selected as winners from this county in the third annual 4-H Club Achievement and Leadership contest sponsored by the state-wide banking institution among the 25,000 club members in Oregon.

Two club members from every county in the state are being announced as winners this week through H. C. Seymour, state club director, in charge of judging and awards. Together with two winners from the City of Portland, the 73 county members will convene in Portland October 5, 6 and 7. Heightened interest and personal achievement among 4-H Club members have made this year's selection a difficult task, according to the local judging committee, composed of George H. Jenkins, county agricultural agent; Mrs. Martha E. Mulkey, county school superintendent; and Harry L. Clasterbos, manager of the Coquille Branch of The First National Bank of Portland.

Maxine Rackleff, with four individual 4-H projects, directed by Mrs. Grace Rackleff, was announced winner among girls for her work in Sewing, Cooking and Canning.

As recognition of his activity in a Dairy and Calf club, Robert Hooks, was chosen from among boys of this county. He is a member of the Coos River Dairy 4-H Club under the leadership of Donald Smith.

Awards include transportation and all other expenses during the visit to Portland, which is being arranged by officers of The First National Bank of Portland. The 74 guests will follow a three-day program which will include attendance at the Pacific International Livestock exposition, sight-seeing tours of Portland, special luncheons, an evening at the Horse Show, banquets and a dance.
