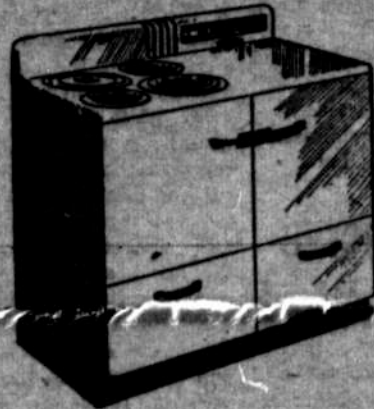
The Ecadriens met at the home of Mrs. W. E. Bosserman Monday for one o'clock luncheon. Fall flowers
