There is a striking difference in appearance of the front of the Buick as compared with previous models, the hood running to more of a point at the nose. The windows permit 30 per cent more vision, most of it being due to a larger windshield, but the uprights and corner supports are also smaller.

The seats are 2½ inches wider, without widening the outside fender measurement and the doors allow two inches more clearance for entering.
