

### Northwest Shingles Get A Break

Congressman James W. Mott received a letter Saturday from President Roosevelt assuring Oregon's first district representative that the president will not enlarge the duty-free quota on Canadian shingle, as he had been requested to do by New England senators and representatives following the recent hurricane-flood disaster in the New England states.

The president's letter was in reply to a telegram sent by Congressman Mott on October 3d urging the president not to enlarge the Canadian shingle quota and pointing out that as there is at present an adequate supply of Oregon and Washington shingles to take care of the New England emergency and that these shingles are available at reasonable prices. Under the Canadian trade agreement the president has authority to enlarge the duty-free quota in certain cases of emergency.

With the letter to Congressman Mott the president enclosed a copy of his letter of the same date to Senator Loneragan of Connecticut who had requested an enlargement of the quota. In his letter the president said:

"I have been advised that action to prevent importation of red cedar shingles in excess of the quota is not warranted under the terms of Section 110 of the Tariff Act. I have been informed by several members of congress and others, on behalf of domestic producers of red cedar shingles, that an adequate supply of domestic cedar shingles is available for any emergency that may exist as a result of the flood-hurricane disaster in New England."

The decision of the president not to invoke the emergency clause of the Canadian Trade Agreement will result in a substantial increase to the Pacific Northwest shingle business which otherwise would have gone largely to Canada.
